Ordinance 24-44 AN ORDINANCE APPROVING, ACCEPTING, RATIFYING AND ADOPTING AN EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF NEWARK, OHIO, AND THE FRATERNAL ORDER OF POLICE LOCAL 127, BLUE AND GOLD UNITS, PROVIDING FOR THE APPLICATION OF ALL TERMS, CONDITIONS, AND BENEFITS OF SAID AGREEMENT, EFFECTIVE UPON EXECUTION THROUGH SEPTEMBER 30, 2027, ABOLISHING THE CURRENT EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT WITH THE EFFECTIVE DATES OF JANUARY 1, 2023 THROUGH DECEMBER 2025, AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS IN CONFLICT WITH THE PROVISIONS OF SAID EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENTS AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Mr. Marmie - This has been something that has been a concern of citizens, what has been happening with our safety services, in particular the police department. We were grossly outside of being competitive with local law enforcement agencies as far as being able to hire. At that point, we kind of held off a little bit to determine whether or not we would get applicants and would be able to maintain staffing. We quickly realized that we were not. Therefore, there was a decision made by the administration to go into negotiations to make a one-time adjustment in order to make sure that we were competitive and we are able to employ new officers and also maintain our current force. It was decided to go ahead and go into complete negotiations to get some other things straightened out and to start just a new agreement. And so that is what this ordinance is doing, and it will end up with a 25, 26, 27, those years are impacted. So, it's going to do away with one of the years of the old contract and start new December the 1st. However, a lot of this will go into effect immediately.

COMMENTS FROM CITIZENS

Brandon Fox, Water Administrator - I just want to bring attention that for those of you that are aware, we have a 16 north sanitary sewer separation project that's coming up in a year or two. We are having a public meeting at the library on December 5th at five o'clock. So, spread the word to folks that may be impacted by that project and want to have a little discussion about that. It's basically Hudson Avenue, Mount Vernon Road, north of 16 up to kind of Quentin and E. Channel Street. So, if you're interested, December 5th, 5 p.m. at the Newark library. Mark Mauter, Economic Development Director - Two things real quick. Number one. Thank you all for passing that lead grant hazard reduction grant funds. The city of Newark was recently awarded an about three and a half million-dollar lead hazard reduction grant from HUD. It came up so quickly that we didn't have time to get the money in the account to get our people to a mandatory training in Washington, DC in just about two weeks. So, thank you very much for doing that. We're excited to have the lead grant. We haven't had one since about 12. We wrapped up the last one. We get a lot of bang for our buck. It helps us to reduce lead hazard risk, especially to children. We're very grateful to take that. It's a four-year grant that we'll be working on this for. The second thing is Resolution 24-93. You approved an updated enterprise zone abatement agreement between the city of Newark that we can now work with county commissioners. This is for a very substantial economic development project by Packaging Corporation of America. There's actually a representative from their leadership team here with us tonight. Just want to make sure that everything's going to go smoothly. It's huge, everyone. It's about \$270 million project for the city of Newark. And we're also just very, very fortunate to maintain a long-time employer with good-paying jobs. They're a good community partner. So Packaging Corporation of America, the way I understand it, was one of the very first economic development deals put together way back approximately 1955, where the city worked with that company to get them located. It wasn't Packaging Corporation of America back then, but it was a corrugated cardboard manufacturer. And it's gone through several reiterations of different enterprises that worked there, but we are very glad, hopefully, to keep them here. And as you may recall, they bought about 90 acres out at Thornwood Drive at the railroad tracks, and that'll keep them on the same rail line that they are currently using there at 21st Street. So, thank you all very much for your consideration.

MISCELLANEOUS

Tricia Moore, Law Director – I'll pass. Thank you.

Mayor Hall – I just kind of dovetail on what Mark said. I truly want to thank PCA for the project that we've been working on for a few years with them. They're here tonight, and I appreciate that. Mark's worked pretty hard on this update, the enterprise agreement, and thanks to Council's support for that. I want to thank Director Rhodes, too. The tower on Horns Hill is a lot of work. There's a lot of parts and pieces to that. It's kind of one of those in a long-term thing to happen, and it's about right now, and it's a good thing. I think grant money is a little tougher because everything's done through the MARCS system anymore. They aren't separate, independent radio systems in our community. So, MARCS has a certain plan that way. So, we'll see what we can get to with that. But thank you for Council's support for that, too, as we move forward. With that, I pass.

Mr. Labutis – Thank you, Mr. President. I want to congratulate Big Brothers and Big Sisters of Licking and Marietta County on a successful fundraiser on Friday night. A couple of us were

there for that. So, congratulations to John Wilson and his team for a great event that evening. Super happy, super excited that we were able to pass 24-44. That's something we needed to do for a while. I'm happy to vote in support of that as well. And finally, I want to welcome Melanie Timmerman back to the Law Director's office. She'll be a great asset. I've known her for a long time and she will do a great job for the city. So welcome Melanie. With that, I will pass.

Mr. Marmie – I need to call a Finance Committee meeting for December the 2nd. Also want to just update folks on Council. We were anticipating trying to get the budget to committee this evening. However, there's been a lot of different things kind of come about where they need to crunch some numbers a little bit more. I want to particularly thank Jim and Jackie in the

Also, those in the various departments who have actually kind of trimmed their budget to try to help out. It's going to be a tight one. Hopefully we will have everything together for the December 2nd meeting. For the first discussion on that. We also hope to have packets out to all of Council so you can have those numbers in advance. So that's kind of the plan as far as the budget. And then of course we would pass it then in that second meeting in December. So that's kind of what it is going on there. I also want to wish everyone a very happy Thanksgiving. We have a lot to be thankful for in our country and in particular within our city. I also have a lot to be thankful for with my family. So, I want to wish everybody a very happy Thanksgiving. And with that, I will pass.

Mr. Neely - Thank you, Mr. President. I will just speak briefly on Ordinance 24-44 as well. I'm also happy to support and to vote for that ordinance. You know, with the contract between the city and the FOP, our numbers in the police department have decreased. We have not been as competitive as some other cities. Police departments lost some officers. So, I think this contract is going to definitely make us much more competitive, keep the good police officers we have and also put us in a position to grow our police department to more appropriate numbers which I think is going to ultimately be a safer situation for our citizens and the city. And with that, I will pass.

Mr. Rath – Thank you. I to want to say I'm happy to see that 24-44 passed. Particularly, I want to thank Mr. Marmie and Mr. Neely for putting in their personal work, all the work that they did on this personally as well as our administration. This is a very long time coming. I'm very, very, very happy to see it go through. I want to wish everybody a happy Thanksgiving. I'll call a service committee meeting for December 2nd. With that, I'll pass.

Mr. Rine - Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like to express my gratitude to all the safety forces. Very proud and honored to have passed Ordinance 24-44. For all the Council that, all the work you did with passing and writing it. I know that the city, the police needed it and I'm very proud to pass that, so with that, I'll pass.

Mr. Barker - Thank you, Mr. President. I need to call a Personnel Committee meeting for December 2nd. I also want to just thank everybody for their support on 24-44. As we hear from citizens all the time, some have said, police, police, police, police. So many of us on this day is here and I think we've delivered with that tonight. So now, Chief, it is in your hands to bring in new officers and bring back some people and we know you'll be working diligently on that. So, we appreciate that. I want to wish everybody a happy Thanksgiving and then not to forget that on the 29th, the Friday after Thanksgiving at 6:15 starts the courthouse lighting event here in downtown. I hope you all can come and enjoy. Downtown will be filled with vendors at the

Canal Market. I know The Works has an event going on in the morning. So, it's going to be a pretty hopping day. We normally have about five to 6,000 people by the time seven o'clock hits in the downtown and having Newark Fire bring Santa in is always a joy and having a secure area by NPD and the sheriffs and EMA is always something we all maybe take for granted, but I appreciate all their work on that. And with that, I'll pass.

Ms. Bline – Thank you, Mr. President. I too want to thank our admin for their work on getting 24-44 through. Thank you, Mr. Marmie. Thank you, Mr. Neely. Great expertise. Thank you to our NPD and our safety forces. What a great collaborative effort. We have such a great city and in order to prosper, we have to have boundaries. Boundaries create capacity. And with capacity, we can grow and expand and do things that we've always wanted to do. Those things that are on our hearts, but in order for that to happen, we need things like this to come to fruition. So, I'm grateful for that. I'd like to thank PCA for coming tonight. Thank you. I appreciate the role you play in the city and in south Newark, certainly. Certainly, you're a blessing to our city. And I thank you, Director Mauter, for all that you do. I'd also like to thank Mr. Rhodes. He's worked on several projects consistently throughout south Newark, and things are looking good. I really appreciate him. And with that, I'll pass.
