Re: Trucked Waste Regulation Clarification

The following items need to be clarified as a result of several problems and questions that have been raised since implementing our new trucked waste regulations.

- ⇒ Combined loads of Residential Septic Wastes or Grease Wastes will be accepted. Do not mix Residential Wastes and Grease Wastes on combined loads.
- ⇒ A separate manifest must be completed on each generator for combined loads of Residential Septic Wastes and Grease Wastes. To clarify this each time a load is placed on a truck, it must have a manifest, even if additional loads are picked up from the same location on a different truck. (i.e. If 500 gals are picked up from John Doe and is on truck #1, it must have a manifest. If another 1000 gals is picked up from John Doe again by truck #2 it must also have its own manifest even though it is the same location.)
- ⇒ Non-Domestic waste must be from a single source. Combined loads of Non-Domestic will not be accepted. **Do not mix Non-Domestic loads with Residential loads.**
- ⇒ Non-Domestic loads must have a completed WEF form on file and pre-approved prior to bringing load to plant for disposal. Make sure that you have this work completed prior to bringing load to plant for disposal. Pre-approval will require testing and may take several days for approval. Once you have been given a WEF number waste can be brought in without pre-approval. **Do not bring Non-Domestic loads to the plant for disposal, if they do not have a pre-approved WEF number on file.**
- ⇒ Non Domestic Wastes will be accepted from (7am to 9pm) only if you have a WEF number previously approved for the waste generator location.
- ⇒ If you have multiple trucks, keep a separate manifest book with each truck.

The Newark Wastewater Plant is working to provide trucked waste service to meet the needs of Licking County and also comply with environmental regulations.
